



These are often confused with the Sandwich salt, the canary one I posted. The bases are a lot alike, heavy petal shapes, but the rims are different. Your #59 may be a piano castor, which the English give the interesting name of Dome of Silence. Four of them are a set, made to go under the rollers of pianos to stop their transferring sound vibrations to the floor. I have a blue one I use for a really heavy paper weight, and I've seen them in green and amber as well as clear. They are way too heavy to make useful salts.




